IT WOULD BE EASY to spend another \$300 to \$750 to update my revolver and keep up with current trends, bringing its lifetime price tag into the range of \$1,800 to \$2,250. Which brings up an obvious question.

Is it worth it? To keep up with the competition, yes, it is mandatory. To look at the investment in other terms, even if it did cost another \$750 to keep up, this revolver has already served well in five Bianchi Cups and the necessary practice, and with a few additions, could be competitive for several more years.

On a cost per year basis, that calculates out to \$290 a year. In my mind, it is certainly not worth risking a poor shot because I didn't have competitive, state-of-the-art equipment.
