

The Value of Dry Firing

There's no better way to work on your trigger control than dry firing.

Dry fire practice allows you to quietly, conveniently, and safely develop and evaluate subtle aspects of your technique. Of course, before you begin any dry-fire session, double check to determine that you are using an unloaded gun for such practice, and point it toward a safe wall that is impenetrable.

During your dry fire session, be very critical about what you see and feel as you set up your stance and grip. You don't want to see your front sight move as you press the trigger. If it does, try to understand why it does and make the necessary corrections.
