

## SIG SAUER P229

Accuracy was best in the test with 2.65-inch groups at 25 yards

The slide release was stiff

A lip that protrudes rearward at the top of the grip holds the web of the shooting hand in position.



More stainless components added 4 ounces of weight to the gun above the S&W's heft

The trigger balks throughout its cycle and stacks near the end

The magazine has a small lip that serves as part of the grip, supporting the little finger of the shooting hand.
