The arrow points to the Marlin's crossbolt safety, a feature the other two guns lacked (though they had half-cock safeties on their hammers). Also, you can see the hammer extension, a piece which screws onto the hammer, allowing the shooter the control the hammer even when a scope is mounted. At the top of the gun is the back end of a Weaver mount screwed onto the top of the receiver. This allowed fast and easy scope mounting, a real advantage the Marlin held over the Henry, which had no provision for mounting a scope. The BL-22 had receiver grooves.
