## Remington 1100 Premier Sporting Twenty No. 82846 2.75-inch 20 Gauge, \$1385 GUN TESTS GRADE: B+

With its heavier weight, the 1100 gas action, and the superb factory R-3 (Limb-

saver) recoil pad, the Remington was clearly the softest shooting 20 gauge in this comparison. In fact, it is one of the softest-shooting 20 gauges we have ever tested. This makes it ideal for younger shooters, lighter shooters, older shooters, or anyone who is recoilsensitive. Though our initial testing left us disappointed, we were very pleased that Remington quickly stepped up to the plate and made it right, as we believe they currently would do for any customer, and just as Browning did with its heavy trigger.



## Beretta AL 391 Urika 2 Gold No. J39TB26 3-inch 20 Gauge, \$1550 GUN TESTS GRADE: F

We found the Beretta Urika 2 20 gauge to be unsatisfying. It kicked us hard, and using a very common Winchester load,

the Beretta Urika 2 Gold was not reliable except as a single-shot. Despite several attempts, we also got no help from the company's customer service department—a sharp, negative contrast to the prompt responses of Browning and Remington.

## Browning Silver Hunter Twenty No. 011350605, \$1079 GUN TESTS GRADE: A



It was easy to select a winner in this match-up; the Browning Gold is all we could ask for in a 20-gauge autoloader. It also did it for \$300 to \$400 less than the

others. It was the most reliable, the easiest to load, the easiest to maintain, and was backed by good customer service, in our view.
